
If the answer is yes, why not join the Scott Bader ROOKIE Club and work through the RLSS Rookie programme.

2ND WOLLASTON SCOUT GROUP

During the Summer period, when the Scout Group don't meet, the adults have a chance to re-charge their batteries. In theory. What actually happens is that we spend some of that 'down time' tidying up our meeting place and stores, keeping the weeds on our allotment down and starting to plan for the new term starting in September and there is always the odd fundraising event to man.

In October, we took a party of Scouts and Explorers to Scarefest, which is a Halloween themed activity weekend at Gilwell Park, near Chingford, Essex (the home of Scouting in the UK).

We have already booked our usual week-long camp for the 2025 May Bank Holiday week – next year we will be returning to one of our favourite sites, the Robin Hood Activity Centre in Sherwood Forest. Before that, we have booked the annual 'Brass Monkey' weekend in February. Northamptonshire Scouts provide a special blanket badge for anyone who sleeps under canvas in the winter months.

Our Beaver Colony was established in 1984, which makes it one of the oldest in the country, and we will be marking our 40th anniversary with a special badge and, no doubt, some special events for the young people. Beavers only became an official part of Scouting in 1986, so Wollaston was very much ahead of the game.

Our catchment area encompasses Bozeat and Grendon, as neither village currently has a Group of their own. Consequently, we have waiting lists in all sections – we have 17 Squirrels, 20 Beavers, 26 Cubs, 29 Scouts and 18 Explorers. 110 young people!

We are always on the lookout for adults who would like to get involved with the Group, whether working with the young people or helping in other ways. We have a Scout Active Support Unit (SASU), who help in all sorts of ways – from helping man a burger stall to getting involved with our allotment (which is used for camp fires rather than growing vegetables!). Hello everybody,

Welcome to Busy Bees article!

As always Busy Bees has been a hive of activity in the last couple of months. Our new starters are all settled and we have just carried out this year's first parents evening, which was a huge success and continues to improve the working relationship between staff, parent and child, always putting the little ones first.

During half term, we hosted a BUSY BEES HALLOWEEN PARTY, which was open for every child in the community. It was 'spooktacular'. Lots of games like wrap the mummy, under and over with a pumpkin and musical bumps. A children's disco and Halloween tea. Thank you to everyone who came and enjoyed the event. Definitely will do another party next year!

Wollaston Tots Group

In September we set up **Wollaston Tots Group** which is run by Penny. This is proving to be very popular and offers a safe environment where adults and young children/babies can come and play, sing and chat. We offer tea, coffee, toast and fruit, which is free of charge. The group runs on a Thursday morning (term time), between 9.15 and 11am in the village hall on the high street. Please feel free to pop along.

Pre-School Activities and learning

As usual the children always lead the sessions and play, choosing and accessing their resources.

With a potential 3 year age gap between the children, activities have to be set up and led in a way that meets the needs of the youngest and oldest child, as well as their range in ability. An example of this is recently we set up a **playdough activity** with various resources and pumpkin seeds.

The younger children would prod, role and make sausages out of the dough, enjoying the process of poking seeds into it!

Older children were able to mould the dough into hedgehog shapes and use the seeds to create spikes!

The language during this activity extended from simple words like soft, hard, smooth, and cold to discussions about Autumn, hedgehogs, nature and environments. Fine motor skills, imagination and exploration are all encouraged and used. The activity also allows for children to bring in other loose play parts like stones and fir cones.

There is no right or wrong in an activity and even outcomes can differ from what we think will happen as children always manage to surprise us!

At the allotment, the children have been using mud and herbs to make muddy pies, using unusual shaped potatoes as dinosaurs and leaves and twigs to create faces and people. The allotment offers children the opportunity to explore the outside.

Often we provide minimal resources to encourage nature based learning and to improve critical thinking.

Allotment visits are every Monday.

If you are looking for a pre-school place please give us a ring on 07908182544 or pop down and see us.

We take children <u>from 2 years</u>. We are now open till 2pm on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, 12 noon on Tuesday's and Thursday's is toddler group. We also offer earlier starts at 8.30/8.45 if this is required.



The Wollaston Town Silver Band (1950) - from Pictorial History of Wollaston by Barry Robinson

Wollaston's Excelsior Band was formed in about 1892 with Bernard's grandfather, Morris Smart, playing double B-flat bass (a type of tuba). Money collected in the village allowed them to buy instruments. On the 25th August 1894, after much practice, the band came second in a competition at Wolverton on their first outing. The band had a clubhouse in High Street and used to practice in a wooden hut that had a small room next to the entrance for storing the instruments. Bernard recalled: "Uncle Fred Smart often related the story of how when he was a child, together with other off-spring of the band, they managed to put the stem of a double bass through a hole in the side of the hut where a knot had fallen out. By fixing the mouthpiece into the instrument from the outside they could make rude noises and attract the secretary who was at the meeting in the main part of the building. Thinking that the

children were messing about, the secretary looked in the instrument room to find no one there. This was repeated two or three times before they realised what was going on."

In 1910 the Excelsior Band became the Wollaston Town Band and later on the Wollaston Town Silver Band (photo above); all brass bands. A 78 originally belonging record to Bernard's father, Alf, has been discovered recently which is a recording of the band from a competition Bletchlev at in December 1950. This recording of "Divertimento" and further information about the transfer can be heard on Youtube by searching for "Wollaston Town Silver Band".




